

There are two different types of scholarship funds, endowment funds and pass-through scholarships. The endowment fund permanently restricts the principal that is donated, and you can only grant scholarships for a certain percentage of the balance of the fund (see below for policies). The pass-through enables you to donate to the fund and the whole amount donated can be given out as a scholarship. Contributions are made to this fund each year to fund scholarships.

Endowment Fund Policies

Currently, all endowment funds are placed in an endowment pool and invested by our fund manager. An investment committee comprised of members of the CREATE Board of Directors meets quarterly to evaluate performance relative to industry standards. Dividend income is allocated to each fund in a proportionate manner, and so are any gains or losses on investment (realized or unrealized).

The disbursement rate or spending policy is currently 4% of the average fund balance for the twelve preceding quarters or since inception of the fund if it is less than three years old. The rate is set annually by the CREATE Board. In January of each year, you will be notified by letter of the amount available to spend. CREATE also charges an administrative fee of 2% on scholarship endowment fund balances. This fee is charged quarterly. Any excess of investment return over these amounts is added to the principal to allow the fund to appreciate and maintain its value over time.

Pass-Through Fund Policies

With the pass-through fund, there is a \$150 administrative fee charged, and the fund does not receive any investment income (interest or dividends). There is no limit as to how much of the balance can be disbursed.

General

With either type of scholarship, you will select the criteria with which you want to evaluate the scholarship applicants. Some scholarships are only available to those graduating from a specific high school. Some specify which college the student must attend. Other criteria could be financial need, class ranking, and/or academic achievements.

At the beginning of every year, CREATE will request that you provide us with the names of your scholarship committee. These names must be approved by the CREATE Board in the March board meeting every year. The Pension Protection Act of 2006 includes three main requirements for the members of this committee:

- 1. The majority of the selection committee must be made up of individuals who are not related parties or employees of the donor. The donor and related parties may sit on the committee, but they may not make a majority of the committee.
- 2. The CREATE Board of Directors must appoint the members of your selection committee. As an advisor, you certainly may suggest the members of the committee.
- 3. The procedure for selecting the scholarship recipient must also be approved in advance by the CREATE Board of Directors.

Committees make their selections by the April board meeting, and scholarships are presented in May. Scholarship payments are released directly to the school for the student's use according to the specific scholarship guidelines (i.e. tuition only, tuition and books, etc.). No scholarship awards are paid directly to awardees.

Fund balance is not invested in a pool


Scholarhsip Passthrough Fund

Administration of Scholarship CREATE can do the following:

Mail applications to high school counselors and collect them on the deadline Send copies of aplications to the scholarship committee for the selection process Print the certificate for the recipient(s) and coordinate with the high school counselor for presentation on awards day Notifiy the recipient of any scholarship requirements and monitor those requirements (i.e. maintaining a certain GPA) Send the scholarship payment directly to the institution Prepare a quarterly fund statement showing the fund activity

Process:

- 1. Applications are distributed through the counselors at Tupelo High School to all interested students.

 - b. Achieve creditable results on either the SAT or ACT
 - c. Show evidence of financial need
 - d. Be a good citizen
 - e. Must attend: Mississippi public university
 - f. Submit a short essay on "Why a College Education is Important to Me"
 - g. Submit two letters of recommendation from THS teachers
- 3. Committee will make the recommendations to the CREATE Board of Directors for approval.
